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Hosting the International Buddhist Conference at the Uganda Buddhist Centre

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a memorable and historical event on the African continent, UBC was honoured to host the International Buddhist Conference on Peace and Conflict Resolution which was held from 24th – 29th June. Venerable Bhikkhus from Bangladesh, India, Uganda, Mexico, Myanmar, Thailand, Germany, Rwanda, and Sri-Lanka were present and delivered dhamma talks, speeches, and presentations.

The conference was attended by the Queen Mother of Tooro who gave a keynote speech and extended an invitation to the Venerable Bhikkhus to hold a future meeting in Tooro kingdom. Also, in attendance were various high ranking representatives from the Ugandan government, representatives from other Kingdoms in Uganda, and members of the public. Venerable Buddharakkhita cordially welcomed attendees from various faith groups, encourag-

ing interfaith dialogue and reminding the public that the UBC was open not only to Buddhists but to people of all walks of life and all faith backgrounds. Besides the Buddhist meditation and chanting at the event, time was also allocated for Christian and Moslem prayers led by dignitaries from these two major faith groups in Uganda.

Venerable Buddharakkhita also urged the Uganda Government representatives to partner with him in fostering faith based tourism in Uganda by introducing Buddhist art and architectural artefacts into the county.

The consecration of the UBC temple grounds marks a historical milestone for the growth of Buddhism in Africa and in Venerable Buddharakkhita's endeavours of sowing Dhamma seeds on the African continent.

This was followed by the ordinations of a Rwandese and Ugandan nationals. On this event, Venerable Sangharakkhita received higher ordination which marked the first ever monk ordinations in Africa.

Research and Meditation Workshop Retreats Held at UBC

enerable Bhante Buddharakkhita led a series of workshops that focused on the role of African Wisdom and the practice of Right Mindfulness in dealing with trauma. The workshops are part of Venerable Buddharakkhita's research for his MPhil paper on "Healing Transgenerational Trauma in Uganda: A Critical Evaluation of the Role of Right Mindfulness and African Wisdom".

Participants benefited from the teachings that covered theory and practice of walking, standing, and sitting meditation as well as mindfulness of eating. Basing on the Satipatthana Sutta, Venerable Buddharakkhita gave indepth teachings on the four foundations of mindfulness. Furthermore, the Venerable also taught the practices of loving-kindness, compassion, and forgiveness which included loving-kindness meditation in the local Ugandan languages. Every day of the workshops included meditation ses-

sions guided by Venerable Buddharakkhita, while his student Venerable Sangharakkhita led asana classes on mindfulness of movement.

Discussions of African Wisdom were conducted within the framework of the Noble Eightfold Path and Mindfulness in particular. Participants continued to exchange knowledge of and discuss African wisdom at a campfire that was set up at the UBC in the evenings and thereafter, most participants stayed in tents set up on the temple grounds. Through the active participation of attendees awareness and appreciation of the core teachings inherent in African proverbs was revived. Several proverbs from different languages were listed in relation to the various elements of the Eightfold Path.
